

Lawns to Legumes pollinator 2025 habitat grants available - apply by Nov. 30, 2024

The Minnesota Board of Water and Soil Resources (BWSR) is accepting applications for spring 2025 Lawns to Legumes pollinator habitat grants.


The program aims to increase habitat for at-risk pollinators in residential settings across the state by providing people with reimbursement-based funding, workshops, coaching and gardening resources.

Anyone who lives in Minnesota and has a yard, deck or other outdoor space for planting can apply to be reimbursed for up to \$400 in costs



associated with establishing new pollinator habitat in their yards. The program is available to both Minnesota homeowners and renters. **Applications will be accepted through Nov. 30, 2024**. 

Shoreland Management – Protect the Lake and the Wildlife

Maintain and/or restore natural vegetation along your shoreline. Natural vegetation:

- Holds soil in place protecting shorelines from increasingly intensive rain events and rising water levels
- Slows runoff and stores moisture
- Filters out nutrients, which along with rising lake temperatures, accelerates algae blooms
- Provides habitat so species can survive in a changing climate
- Increases property values by keeping lakes clean.

Minnesota law requires water recreationists to:

- Clean watercraft of all aquatic plants and prohibited invasive species.
- **Drain** all water by removing drain plugs and keeping them out during transport.
- **Dispose** of unwanted bait in the trash and dispose of bait water.
- **Dry** docks, lifts, swim rafts and other equipment for at least 21 days before placing equipment into another water body.



Be sure to inform your visitors and neighbors of this important Minnesota regulation, which is also important and necessary to keep our lake clean and free of invasive species.

The walleye slot limit on Farm Island Lake is 16'' - 19''. Fish this size are to be immediately released. It's a bit confusing - on FIL the slot limit from 16-19 inches designates the size to NOT be kept.



Release 16 – 19 inch walleyes. This protects the best breeders on Farm Island Lake, per the DNR.



Speaking of fish size! Bruce VanDenBoom was visiting friends on the lake and caught a 30" catfish!



New Minnesota Law:

Effective July 1, 2023, it's illegal to place garbage and human/ other waste on or under the ice on Minnesota's lakes and rivers. Garbage, rubbish, cigarette filters, debris from fireworks, offal, the body of a dead animal, litter, sewage and any other waste needs to be stored inside your shelter, motor vehicle or any other conveyance or inside a container that is secured to your shelter, motor vehicle or conveyance.

\$100 civil penalty for each violation

Get the Lead Out - New Information

Get the Lead Out (GTLO) is an educational program by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency (MPCA) that aims to reduce the amount of lead-based fishing tackle that loons are exposed to.

- Goal: Protect and restore the loon population in Minnesota
- **Methods**: Educate and promote lead-free tackle alternatives, and provide tackle exchanges where people can trade in lead-based tackle for lead-free tackle
- Benefits: Helps protect wildlife and human health

The program started in the early 2000s, and in its first run, the MPCA coordinated over 200 tackle exchanges that collected more than 8,000 lbs. of lead.

Here are some tips for identifying lead tackle:

- Lead is a soft, dense metal that is easy to mold and shape.
- Lead is gray and dull in color. If you scratch lead on paper, it will leave a gray mark.
- Lead poisoning can have negative effects on the nervous and reproductive systems of birds and mammals. Loons with lead poisoning may experience physical and behavioral changes, such as: loss of balance, gasping, tremors, and limited flying abilities.
- Depending on how much lead a loon swallows, it can die within two days to three weeks.




At August-end there were 4-6 loon chicks. The adult loons are gone, but as of Nov. 6th I saw an immature loon still here.
